Watch 'Madagascar'. Which animals did you like best? Focus on the scene as they arrive on the island https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=nhYxHNXM5io What would you do if you found yourself marooned on a desert island? Can you write an imaginative story of what happens? Describe your surroundings. How did you get there? What would you eat and drink? What adventures could you have? Who would be with you? What essential items would you take? You may need to think about your survival. Can you build a shelter, light a fire? Maybe you could write a postcard home to your family and put it into a glass bottle to float on the sea? In the Madagascar film there are a few contrasting settings - the Central Park Zoo, the cargo ship and the island of Madagascar. Can you compare them? Who might you find there? What does it look like? What would it be like there? What might happen there? 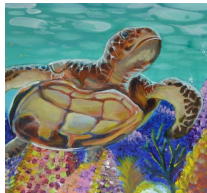
For some ideas of weaving as they do on Madagascar - a great art project to try.

(Subjects included - Science, Geography, History & RE)

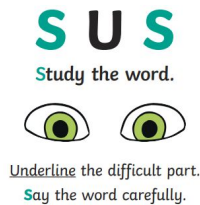

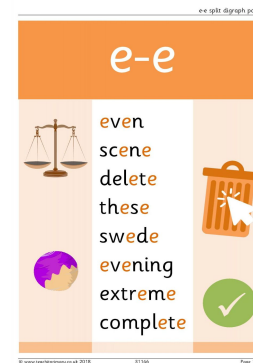
